

Recorded in 1965 for Arhoolie Records, this track by Clifton Chenier and his band is the song that made the modern genre, zydeco. The title nods to a Creole phrase, "zydeco et pas salés," or "snap beans and no salt," meaning Louisiana Creole Accordion King "just getting by." Chenier's brother, Cleveland, is featured on rubboard with Madison Guidry on drums. The track was part of a recording session of Chenier's first full-length album for Arhoolie, Louisiana Blues and Zydeco, but became a Gulf Coast regional hit first as an Arhoolie 45 (ARH 45-511).

When the Rolling Stones came to the US on tour in 1965, they had a habit of checking out record shops for sonic treasures. One they found was an LP by the "King of Zydeco," Clifton Chenier. That album, Louisiana Blues and Zydeco (ARH 1024), was the first full-length album Chenier recorded for Chris Strachwitz's Arhoolie label. Mick Jagger has affirmed how important those Arhoolie records and Clifton's music were to him. In this 21st-century tribute to Clifton Chenier, the Rolling Stones join a supergroup of Louisiana musicians including Steve Riley, CC Adcock, Ivan Neville, and Zachary Richard, along with Chenier's long-time drummer, Robert St. Julien.
