
BUILD AND SING songs for architects, builders, planners



In November 1989 my daughter, Patti, an architect in Asheville, North Carolina, brought together a group of architects, planners, craftsmen and builders for whom I prepared a program called *Build and Sing*, now available on this cassette.

As a folk singer specializing in songs of social commentary, I had performed countless programs for school teachers, environmentalists, women's groups, social workers, lawyers, labor leaders and politicians—but this was going to be a tougher challenge. (True, I had done a shorter version of this program at the Yale School of Architecture but that was ten years earlier.)

I collected all the songs, and appropriate stories, I could find about housing, building, urban renewal, living in the city, driving to the suburbs, and recorded the program before the assorted architects and others at an intimate theatre in Asheville. This cassette is the result.

So if you are an architect, builder, urban planner, building craftsman, landscape architect, sociologist, environmentalist, social historian, or just an interested layman, you should enjoy these songs and stories. You won't find a similar cassette on the planet.



JOE GLAZER has been singing, composing and recording songs of social commentary for almost fifty years. He has recorded more than twenty-five LP albums and cassettes. His voice and guitar have been heard in almost every state and in sixty different countries. Wisconsin's Senator William Proxmire remarked after hearing Joe Glazer sing: "You are the world's greatest troubadour in my view. In fact—you are the only troubadour that I give a damn for."
