Notes on the Tunes

1. Captain Campbell/Blair Atholl/Quebecois Reel.

David Paton: concertina; Danny Noveck: guitar Captain Campbell is a strathspey learned from the playing of the Cape Breton Symphony. It is followed by a Scottish reel from John Cunningham. The third tune I heard played at the Champlain Valley Folk Festival.

- **2. Dever the Dancer/Swaggering Jig** (slip jigs) David: concertina & hammered dulcimer; Marcus Casman: guitar & bass Irish slip jigs are among my favorite tunes to play, and these are always rollicking.
- 5. Maybelle's March/Brian O'Lynn David: concertina; Danny: guitar & tenor banjo; Marcus: bass
 Maybelle's March is a Cape Breton tune that I learned from banjo player Pete Farley.
 Brian O'Lynn comes from the legendary Clare piper, Willie Clancy.
- **4. Breton Waltz** David: concertina & mountain dulcimer; Danny: guitar I got this waltz from Hartford musician Steve Liebman, along with most of the Breton music on this recording. Thanks, Steve!
- **5. Ton des Chevaux/Hanter Dro** David: concertina; Danny: guitar Lively Breton dances.
- **6.Sleep Soond I' Da Moarnin/Far from Home** David: hammered dulcimer; Danny: tenor banjo; Skip Healy: flute
 Two Shetland reels that I have played for years.
- 7. An Paistin Fionn David: concertina; Danny: guitar This beautiful Irish waltz I learned from the great musician and friend, Skip Gorman.
- **8.Kerry Polkas** David: concertina; Skip Gorman: fiddle; Cindy Kallet: guitar The first of these tunes came from a Shanachie Kerry Music recording and was called "Blue Ribbon Polka." The second is from a "Fiddlecase" tune book.
- **9.Young Catherine (O'Carolan)** David: concertinas; Marcus: guitar My own setting of a tune by the legendary Irish harper.

- **10. Sandol's Tune/Breton Dance** David: concertina, mountain dulcimer & hammered dulcimer; Danny: guitar & mandolin; Marcus: bass A tune of unknown origin that fiddler Sandol Astrausky learned in Sweden, followed by a well-known Breton dance.
- **11. Irish Jigs** David: concertina; Danny: tenor banjo; Marcus: guitar Danny got this first tune in Ireland and the second is one of my own.
- **12. Garrai na Bhfeileoig** David: concertina; Danny: guitar A hornpipe that Danny and I both learned from Mary Bergin's album.
- 13. An Dro/Dinky's Reel David: concertina; Danny: guitar & tenor banjo; Marcus: bass
 Two Breton tunes and an Irish reel.
- **14. Waltz from Orsa/Walking Tune** David: concertina; Danny: guitar \mathcal{E} mandolin Like many Swedish tunes, these weave in and out of major and minor. The second
- tune is usually played slower.

 15. Ten Penny Bit/Laurel Tree/Martin Wynne's Reel David: concertina;
- Danny: tenor banjo; Skip Healy: flute

 An Irish jig and two reels.
- **16. An Dro** David: concertina; Danny: guitar Pretty and stately Breton dance tunes.
- 17. Scatter the Mud/Sixpenny Money David: concertina & hammered dulcimer; Marcus: guitar; Robin Paton: mandolin A set of jigs I learned from piper Bruce Foley.
- 18. Polska from Enviken/Tommy Cohen's Reel David: concertina;
 Danny: guitar; Marcus: bass

 Polska From Enviken comes from Swedish fiddlers Biorn Stabi and Ole Hierth. It

Polska From Enviken comes from Swedish fiddlers Bjorn Stabi and Ole Hjorth. It is followed by an Irish reel.

David Paton is considered by many to be America's premier English concertina player. This recording will serve to confirm that judgment. Here is a great variety of musical styles from Irish jigs, reels, polkas and slow airs to Breton dances and Swedish melodies, all demonstrating David's mastery of his primary instrument. He also plays hammered dulcimer and mountain dulcimer on some of the selections. Playing here with David are a number of other musicians, adding guitar, mandolin, tenor banjo, fiddle, flute and bass.



David was born in an Irish neighborhood in London in 1958, while his parents were studying the British antecedents of American folk music. He was raised in New England and now lives on Sharon Mountain in Sharon, Connecticut, with his wife, Catherine, and his daughter, Linnea. He has performed at many major folk clubs and festivals and has been a guest artist on a number of records.
