VOLUME 1. DANCES FROM THE BALKANS AND NEAR EAST

The folk dances of the Balkans and Near East is appealing, extremely varied and in some ways truly unique. It is an essential part of everyday living. There are dances for every activity; Love Dances, Work Dances, Ritual Dances, War Dances. The vigor of these dances are beyond the description of words. Folkway Records are proud to present these Folk Dances complete with their descriptions from some of the countries of the Balkans and Near East.

Dance notes and descriptions collected and compiled by Folk Dance specialists, Ronnie and Stu Lipner, from publications both in English and the language of the countries presented, from natives and people who have traveled throughout the area.

CROATIAN FOLK DANCES (SLAVONSKO KOLO & A DRMES)

The most lilting and melodious of all the Yugoslav dances are the ones from Slavonia and Croatia proper. Usually all the men are

together in one portion of the circle and the women are in the other part. This is due to the fact that there is much singing while they dance. The women will sing first and the men will answer. The music for these dances were recorded by The Yugoslav National Folk Ballet, "TANEC", on their first tour of the United States in 1956. The description of the steps are given based upon the typical steps used in Slavonia & Croatia.

RECORD - FOLKWAY RECORD (Tanec Record, Side 2, Band 1)

- FORMATION The men are together as are the women, all move to the Left. Hands are joined by locking middle fingers with the second person on each side. Right arm passes over the Left, and Left arm passes under arm of person next to you. In open circle, men with free arms join hands with person next to you. Other formations will be noted.
- STEP 1 In open circle formation (See Above) and all leaning fwd, take 12 of these basic steps, moving to the Left.

 Cross R over L, Step L to side, Cross R behind L, Step L to side. (1 step per measure)
- STEP 2 In closed circle formation (See Above) do this step 24 times. With weight on R ft., bend R knee, Lifting on ball of R ft., straighten R knee while placing L ft. slightly to side. Now lower R heel in sort of a bouncy fashion twice. Repeat this step starting with L ft., Bend L ft., straighten L ft. while placing R ft. to side and bounce twice on L ft. This step is done while moving to the L.
- STEP 3 Starting with R ft., take 4 step-hops into center of circle & take 4 step-hops away from center of circle, still in closed circle formation.
- STEP 4 Do the following combination of steps 4 times in all, do Step 2 four times and do Step 3 once.
- STEP 5 Repeat Step 2, twelve times in all.
- STEP 6 Repeat Step 3, once.
- STEP 7 Do the following combination of steps 3 times in all, do step 2 four times and do step 3 once. Immediately after doing this place hands on neighbor's shoulder for DRMES dance which follows.

DRMES DANCE

- STEP 8 Step on R ft. in place and bend both knees, straighten both knees, then lower and raise both heels in place so as to create a bounce effect (Shaking). Do this step 5 times, slowly for first two and fast for last three. Step is done in place.
- STEP 9 Step R across L moving to left, bend R knee as you cross.

 Take a large step to the L with the left foot and straighten R knee. Repeat this step 11 more times, 12 times in all.
- STEP 10- Repeat Step 8 four times in all.
- STEP 11- Repeat Step 9 twelve times in all.
- STEP 12- Repeat Step 8 four times in all.

BAVNO ORO (MACEDONIA)

This dance was learned in Macedonia and presented at the College Of The Pacific Folk Dance Camp in 1955.

RECORD - FOLKWAY RECORD LP # Band 8. (From Record of same name)

FORMATION - Two lines of dancers facing each other, Men on one side, Women on the other. Hands joined, M with the M, W with the W and held shoulder high. First Man at R end of line with R hand free, first woman at left of her line with L hand free. The knee lift for the Men is high, Women not so high. Both M & W start with same ft., lines move in opposite directions.

SLOW PART OF DANCE

PART 1

- 1- Step side R, start to cross L over R, step L across R ft.
- 2- Step side R, bend L knee and lift it high in front of R, and pause.
- 3- Step side L ft., bend R knee and lift it high in front of R and pause.
- 4- Repeat #2 again.
- 5- Step L across in front of R, hold for 1 count & step R. 6-10- Repeat measures 1-5 again, starting with the L. ft.

PART 2

- 11- Step fwd R, start fwd with L, step fwd L ft.
- 12- Step fwd R, bend L knee and lift it high and pause. (Lines at this point are close together, practically shoulder to shoulder with their lifted knees under the joined hands.
- 13- Step bwd L, start bwd R, step bwd R.
- 14- Step bwd L, bend R knee and raise R ft. behind L knee and pause.
- 15- Step side R ft., step L across in front of R, bend R knee slightly. (takes 3 counts)
- 16-17-Repeat #15 twice more, three times in all.
- 18- Step side R, touch L heel across in front of R & hold 1 count.
- 19-24-Repeat #11-16, starting with L ft. doing #15 only twice, moving to the left.
- 25- Repeat #18, starting with L ft.

PART 3

- 26- Step side R, touch L in front of R, step L across R bending R knee slightly, joined hands are held down.
- 27-28-Repeat #26 two more times, three times in all.
- 29- Step side R, touch L heel across and in front of R and pause 1 count.
- 30-33-Repeat #26-29 reversing action and starting with L ft. 34-41-Repeat #26-33 again.
- 42- With weight on L ft., raise arms to original position and lift R knee high in front of L.
- 1-41- Repeat parts 1,2 & 3 again ommitting #17 of part 2. Only the first time are there 4 measures in that part. Also omit #42.

FAST PART OF DANCE

The second part of this dance is written in a 7/16 meter. The count is therefore 1-2, 1-2, 1-2-3, for three counts.

PART 4

- Both M & W take small step R in place, small step L in place. Step R across in front of L with both knees bent, lifting L clear of floor. (1-2, 1-2, 1-2-3 count, etc.)
- 2-7 Repeat #1, alternating L and R ft.
- 8- Men repeat # 2 again while W step L in place, step R in place and close L to R.

During the 8 measures of part 4, the two lines of dancers approach each other. They release hands in their own line and the first man keeping his R hand free takes the L hand of the first W with his L. The first W joins her R hand with the R of the second Man etc., forming a chain.

PART 5

- 9- Steps are described for M, W does counterpart. Step side with R close L to R, quickly step R in place and cross L in front of R with both knees bent.
- 10-16-Repeat # 9 Seven times more, (8 times in all) as first M leads chain around the room progressing Counter-clockwise.
- 17-24-Repeat # 1-8 in part 4, on opposite footwork, W starting L ft., M starting R ft. in chain formation.
- 25-32-Repeat # 9-16 in Part 5, ending dance with hands held high.

ELENO MOME (DEAR HELEN)

A popular Bulgarian Horo learned from various Bulgarians in this country. Presented at the College Of The Pacific Folk Dance Camp in 1956.

RECORD - Folkway LP, Band 1

FORMATION - An open circle, hands joined and held down at sides.

Leader has a knotted handkerchief in his R hand and
waves it constantly through the movements.

COUNT TO STEPS IS: SLOW, SLOW, QUICK, SLOW. Dance may be started at any point so long as leader picks up beat of music. It is advisable to wait a few measures to accustom the dancers with the beat.

STEP 1 -	Facing to the R, step R ft. to R, Step L ft. in front of R ft., Step R ft. to R, facing center, Step L ft. in back of R ft.	(S) (S) (Q) (S)
STEP 2 -	Step R ft. to side Hop R ft. in place, kicking L fwd. Step L ft. to L Step R ft. in back of L	(S) (S) (Q) (S)
STEP 3 -	Step L ft. to L side Hop L ft. in place, kicking R fwd Step R ft. to R Step L ft. in back of R	(S) (S) (Q) (S)

NARODNO HORO (NATIONAL HORO)

A popular Horo Dance learned from natives who have spent many years in Bulgaria. Many variations exist. Below is described the basic step.

RECORD - Folkway LP, Band 2.

FORMATION - An open circle with hands joined and held at shoulder height and slightly extended toward the center of circle.

- STEP 1 Facing to the R, step on R ft. to the R, hop on R ft., moving to the R step on L ft. and hop on L ft.
- STEP 2 Step R ft. to side, step L ft. in back of R, step R ft. to side, close L ft. to R, but still keep weight on R ft.
- STEP 3 Step L ft. to side, step R ft. in back of L, step L ft. to side, close R ft. to L, but still keep weight on L ft.

It is advisable to wait a few measures to get the feel of the music. Leader may start at any point, so long as he picks up the beat of the dance.

DAICHOVO HORO

A popular Horo danced all over Bulgaria. It is described in "Bulgarian Horos" by Boris Tzonev, Science & Art Edition, Sophia in 1950. It was presented at the College Of The Pacific Folk Dance Camp in 1956 by Anatol Joukowsky.

RECORD - Folkway LP, Band 3.

FORMATION - An open circle or line with hands joined and held down.

In performing each step there is a slight bending of the knee. Weight on balls of feet. Heels close to floor.

Since the music is in a 9/16 meter, the steps are described in a diagramatic form with the counts above the step description. LOD means Line Of Direction.

COUNT IS:

NOTE: Dance has 5 measures while music has 4 measures. It is advisable to listen to music several times before putting steps to music. In the hop & lifting step, leg is straightened when lifted.

STARA SVADBARSKO HORO (WEDDING DANCE)

Macedonia-Bulgarian Folk Dance described in "Bulgarian Folk Dances with examples of Macedonian Folklore" by Professor S. Jujev, Sophia. Presented at College Of The Pacific Folk Dance Camp, 1956.

RECORD - Folkway Record - LP, Band 4.

FORMATION - An open circle or line, hands joined by interlocking last two fingers on R hand with neighbor's.

TSAMIKO (GREEK)

Tsamiko, a rather interesting dance of the peasants and shepherds in Greece. Although not difficult, it has a tricky rhythm that one must get used to. The best way of learning the dance is to walk through the steps many times without the music.

RECORD - Folkway Record (Greek Record, Band 5, Side 1.)

FORMATION - An open circle with leader at Right. Leader of dance may decide to give someone else a chance to lead, so he goes to the end of the line and the next person takes over.

Step 1 - Step R ft. to side and pause. Step L ft. in front of R, Close R ft. to L. Step L ft. in Line of Direction, (LOD) and pause.

Step on R ft. in LOD, close L to R ft. Step on L ft. in LOD & pause.

Step on L ft. in LOD Step on R ft. in LOD turning to face center of circle. Lift L leg, knee bent so as to produce a quiver of L ft.

Step 2 - Step on L ft. moving to L, Step on R ft. in front of L.

Step on L ft. turning to face center of circle and lift R leg, knee bent so as to produce a quiver of R ft.

Quiver is produced by drawing the lifted foot alongside the stationary foot above ankle height.

REPEAT DANCE FROM BEGINNING TILL END OF RECORDING.

As Greek music is not phased to our knowledge of measures and beats, it is best to practice the dance using these cues to guide the steps and timing.

STEP, PAUSE STEP-TOGETHER-STEP-PAUSE - STEP-TOGETHER-STEP, PAUSE.

STEP, PAUSE STEP, PAUSE & LIFT. STEP, CROSS PAUSE STEP & LIFT.

DANCE NOTES COMPILED AND COLLECTED BY FOLK DANCE SPECIALISTS:

RONNIE & STU LIPNER.

NOTE - It is best to start the dance when the vocal starts. Dance may be started any time during the music, so long as the leader picks up the beat of the music.

KALAMATIANO (GREEK)

The most popular of the Greek Dances, and one of the oldest originating in Peloponnesus (South of Greece). All Greek social affairs open with a "Kalamatiano. It derives its name from the city of Kalamata, a city famous for its beautiful women and silk handkerchiefs.

- MUSIC FOLKWAY RECORD (Greek Record Side 1, Band 2)
- FORMATION Open circle, hands joined and held at shoulder height.

 Leader may join the circle with a handkerchief held
 between himself and next dancer.
- STEP 1 All facing center of circle, Step R to side, Step L in bank of R, Step R to side and hop on R in place.
- STEP 2 Step L in front of R, Step (small) on R to side, Step L in front of R.
- STEP 3 Step R to side and point L across and in front of R.
 Step L to side and point R across and in front of L.

REPEAT ENTIRE DANCE FROM BEGINNING AND CONTINUE TILL END OF RECORDING.

GERAKINA (GREEK)

- MUSIC FOLKWAY RECORD, (Greek Record Side 1, Band 5)
- SOURCE This dance was presented at the College Of The Pacific Folk Dance Camp in 1954.
- FORMATION An open circle, dancers join hands with L arms extended about shoulder high; R arm shoulder high beneath and supporting extended L arm of the next dancer. Dancers face to the Right.

(Timing of the steps are noted in parenthesis) (S-slow, Q-quick)

INTRODUCTION - 1 measure.

- STEP 1 Step on R ft., hop on R ft., step L in front of R, and step on R ft. (S (hop) QQ)

 Hop is omitted the first time and added for repeats.

 Step L ft. in back of R and touch R toe out. (SS)

 REPEAT STEP 1 THREE TIMES IN ALL.
- STEP 2 Moving to the R, Step R, Step L, Step R, step L and touch R toe in and touch R toe out. (SQQ, SQQ)
 Step R, Step L, Step R (SQQ)
 Step L and face center of Circle and touch R toe out, (SS)
 while raising joined hands forward.
- STEP 3 Moving forward toward center of circle step R,L,R,L and touch R toe in and R toe out. (SQQ, SQQ)

 Moving back away from center, drop back to sitting position on R ft. with toe touching floor in front of R knee, then flick forward with a slight kick. Step L and then step R. (SQQ)

 Drop back again to sitting position on Left foot with L toe touching floor in front of L knee, then flick forward with a slight kick, step R and then step Left (SQQ)

STEP 4 - With weight still on L ft. touch R ft. as follows, Toe in,
Toe out, Toe in, Toe out. On the second touch release hands
leave L arm extended diagonally, palm out and fingers pointing up. R arm bent and behind back. Lift R foot, knee bent
with toe out. (SCO SS)

With arms still in position each dancer turns Clockwise in place; Step R, Step L, Step R, end facing center. (SQQ) Step L and touch R toe out. (SS)

REPEAT ENTIRE DANCE TILL END OF RECORDING DOING STEP 1 MORE VIGOROUSLY WITH EACH REPEAT.

DANCE NOTES COLLECTED AND COMPILED BY FOLK DANCE SPECIALISTS: RONNIE & STU LIPNER

The Rumanian national dance is the Hora. It is a circular dance with many varieties and over 1500 names. The musicians play in the center of the circle. This dance has become symbolic of national brotherhood and unity.

RUMANIAN HORA

MUSIC - Folkway Record. (Rumanian 12" LP Side 1, Band 2)

- FORMATION A closed circle with hands joined and held shoulder high.

 It is advisable to wait a few seconds to get the feel of
 the music before starting. Below are described just
 three of the many steps that exist.
- STEP 1 Step R to the R, Step L behind R, Step R to side and swing L in front of R. Now moving to the Left.

 Step R to the L, Step R behind L, Step L to side and swing R in front of L.

 REPEAT THIS STEP 8 TIMES IN ALL.
- STEP 2 Step R to side and swing L over R, Step L to side and swing R over Left. Step side with R, Step L behind R, step R to side bring L next to R but do not step on it. Now move to Left.

Step L to side and swing R over L, Step R to side and swing L over Right. Step L to side, step R behind L, step L to side and step R next to L but do not step on it.
REPEAT THIS STEP FOUR TIMES IN ALL

STEP 3 - Step R to side, Step L next to R, Step R to side, Step L next to R and then Step in place RLR, & LRL. (these are really two steps performed in place quickly, count is step 23, step 23)

REPEAT THIS STEP FOUR TIMES IN ALL.

REPEAT DANCE FROM BEGINNING TILL END OF RECORDING.

HORO DANCES FROM BULGARIA & MACEDONIA

PRAVO HORO (DILINDARO)

A popular Bulgarian Horo. Described in "Bulgarian Horos, Volume 1" by Boris Tzonev, Science & Art Edition, Sophia, 1950. Presented at College Of The Pacific Folk Dance Camp in 1956.

Record - Folkway Record, Band 5

FORMATION - An open circle or line, for part 1, hands are on neighbors' belts; part 2, hands are joined and held down.

PART 1

- STEP 1 Step R to the R. Cross L in front of R. Step R to Right side and close L to R ft.
- STEP 2 Step L to the L, Cross R in front of L. Step L to the L and close R to L ft.
- STEP 3 REPEAT STEPS 1 & 2 AGAIN.
- STEP 4 Turning slightly to the R, leap to the R with the R ft., step (a) Left in Line of Direction, step R in LOD. (Line of Direction)
 - (b) Turning slightly to the L, leap to the L with the L ft., step Right in Line of Direction, Step L in LOD. (Line of Direction)
- STEP 5 REPEAT STEP 4 TWO MORE TIMES.
- STEP 6 Repeat Step #4 Part (a) once, then stamp L ft. twice.
- PART 1 IS DANCED 9 COMPLETE TIMES, THEN A 2 MEASURE INTERLUDE WHEN DANCERS CHANGE HAND POSITION, AND GET SET FOR PART 2.

PART 2

Leader leads the line in a snake-like fashion around the room, using this step.

1 - Hop on L ft. and raise R knee high, then step in LOD Right, Left Hop on R ft. and raise L Knee high, then step in LOD Left, Right and Left. Continue this step until end of record.

CIRCLE DANCES FROM THE BALKAN COUNTRIES

DAICHOVO HORO # 2 (BULGARIA, MACEDONIA)

This dance represents another version of a type found in Bulgaria, Macedonia and parts of Serbia. Many other patterns and melodies exist. This dance was presented at the College Of The Pacific Folk Dance Camp by teachers who have traveled in the area and seen it performed.

RECORD - FOLKWAY LP # BAND-5 (FROM SPECIAL RECORD)

- FORMATION- Circle with hands joined and held down. Leader at right end of circle. Dance contains 5 counts per 1 measure of music, (Count 1,2,3,4, & pause). Steps described take 10 measures of music altogether.
- FIGURE 1 Takes 5 measures of music. Hop on L ft. moving to the Right. Take three steps in line of direction. R,L,R and pause. Repeat this three times more, 4 times in all. The first two times moving to the (a) right, the third moving backward and the fourth
 - (b) Stamp R foot in place 4 times and pause. (1 measure)

time moving slightly to the L. (4 Measures)

- FIGURE 2 Step fwd R ft., close L to R, step fwd again R and bring L up to R. Repeat this stepping fwd again and
 - finish with figure 1 (b). (3 measures of music) (a)
 - (b) Hop on L ft. while scuffing R ft. across L, pause 2 counts, turning to R, point R ft. fwd, and scuff R heel back and pause. (1 measure). Then stamp in place R.L.R.L & pause. (1 measure). Figure 2 (b) takes 2 measures in all.

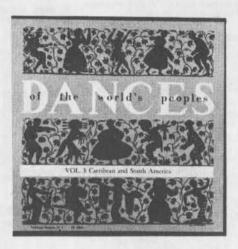
