BIOGRAPHY

I am an elementary school librarian, a rancher and cowpuncher, a composer and author. I was born in Los Angeles, the second oldest in a family of eight children. My parents were and are extraordinary people who always encouraged us to keep growing as persons, and helped us develop our abilities. I was raised in a home with valuing of books and music, learning and caring.

Music was always important to me. As a child and teenager, I loved to sing and dance, and to make up melodies. I also always loved animals and the outdoors. When my family moved to a small ranch in Arizona, that love of outdoors was fully realized. I have been involved in ranching for 22 years.

I received a B.A. in Music in 1961, a M.Ed. in Elementary Education in 1963, and a Ph.D. in Reading in 1971, all from the University of Arizona. I worked as an elementary school teacher for 50 years, and have worked as an elementary school librarian with Tucson Unified School District for 9 years, currently working part-time as school librarian, part-time as rancher. I have also written two books for young children published by Scholastic. In addition, I have been involved in workshops on creative writing, and in 1978 taught a university course in storytelling.

As a librarian, I like to combine literature and music by having story hours centering around a theme and ending with a song. For me, it has been easier and more natural to write the song than to find one, for I had in mind just what I wanted the song to say.

I write songs because songs can motivate and enhance any idea, and do so with feeling and delight.

I love to work with young people. They keep me refreshed and growing. And my work with them will continue to be a stimulus and wellspring for the writing of more and more songs.

Introductions

Songs are a means of expression of universal appeal. They combine rhythm and melody with idea and feeling. They are a form of language expression totally non-threatening, even to those persons uncomfortable with other forms of language expression. When children read to sing song lyrics, they are hardly aware that they are reading. They are fully absorbed in reading for meaning, reading in context, reading as a means to the end of enjoyment of the song.

Songs bring people together. When singing together, we are joined in common thought and feeling in a relaxed, enjoyable atmosphere of sharing. Songs can be poignant, stirring, thought-provoking; or they can be full of zest and fun. But songs can add a spark of life to any moment as they seem to beckon to us to respond to the song itself and to one another:

Notes About the Songs:

Side One: Songs About People

1. EVERYONE HAS FEELINGS

Everyone has a wide range of feelings, from happiness, excitement and pride to enger, frustration, and fear. We all need to accept our feelings, including the confusion of sometimes having mixed and conflicting feelings at the same time. Young people may wish to act out this song and think of other feelings in more verses they could add later.

2. JUST BY WATCHING

Our five senses are avenues of awareness and exploration of the world around us. Children can think of many other things they like to see, hear, smell, taste, or touch, and incorporate into adapted verses the things of special and personal meaning to them.

3. ALL ACROSS THIS WIDE WIDE WORLD

Crossing all boundaries of differences in culture, custom, nationality, color, religion, politics, and background, people around the world are slike in many important and basic ways. We share a common humanity that transcends our differences. Young people can effectively act out every line of this song as they sing. They may also wish to add more verses, thinking of more characteristics they share in common with other people "all across this wide wide world."

4. OUR BLACK BROTHERS

People of all ethnic groups have made important contributions to the growth and strength of America. Black Americans have made significant contributions throughout our history and in almost every sphere of endeavor. The twelve Black Americans described in these verses only begin to touch on the breadth and significance of accomplishments of individual Black Americans. Young people may wish to add more verses about contemporary black contributors who have special meaning to them.

5. LANGUAGES WE SPEAK

Language is the primary source of communication inviting people to respond to other people. Children are intrigued by different languages and delight in learning them. This song may not only invite more fluency in Spanish and French, but perhaps also motivate young people to find out those expressions in other languages as well.

Side Two: Songs About Animals

1. WHAT HAPPENED TO THE DINOSAURS?

Any librarian knows that the interest of children in dinosaurs is insatiable. Books on those first "real monsters" simply will not stay on the shelves! Scientists still differ on the exact cause or combination of causes of their extinction. Perhaps children can offer their own insights!

2. ONCE I HAD TWO LITTLE RABBITS

All children enjoy pets. This little song about pets in pairs can invite creative writing by young people in thinking of other verses with other animal pets in pairs. They may especially enjoy thinking of humorous names and sound effects for those pets!

3. WALKING IN THE WOODS

In any environment there is much to explore and much to experience through the senses. This song invites sensory exploration in many different places, from walking in the woods to running on a sandy beach.

4. RATTLE RATTLE RATTLE and a SHAKE SHAKE SHAKE

Although some children fear snakes, many are fascinated by them. This song deals with a snake most feared - the rattlesnake - yet combines caution with a bit of humor in the contrasting slow and fast verses. It also invites learning more about other snakes totally harmless.

5. WHEN A BIG FAT HIPPOPOTAMUS IS YAWNING

Children often like to imagine themselves as different kinds of animals. A trip to the zoo can evoke response by children in the sounds and movements of animals with which they can identify. They can act out this song and also think of other images of what different animals are like.
