ABRAHAM LASS is the author of a number of books on the English language. He is co-author and narrator of Dominando El Ingles: Mastery of English Pronunciation: A Guide for Spanish-Speaking People (Folkways Records Fl 8201). For 21 years, Mr. Lass was a principal in the New York City high schools.

BETTY LASS, a graduate of Columbia University and a lifelong student of the English language, has actively collaborated with her husband on all of his books. In preparing this album, she has again worked in tandem with him.

Introduction (2 - 74) *

Most people have trouble pronouncing some English words correctly. Some of these are quite common, everyday words. Others are not so common. You know the meaning of some. But you aren't sure how to pronounce them--because you haven't heard them pronounced in daily conversation, or on radio, or on television. And to complicate matters, some words have only one acceptable pronunciation. Others have 2, 3, and even more acceptable pronunciations.

For this program we have drawn up a list of words that confuse and embarrass even the best-educated people. There are, of course, many other troublesome words. We couldn't possibly include them all here. But those on our list rank high among words that are frequently mispronounced.

We have designed this program to be practical, useful, and easy to follow. And here's how it works:

*The numbers under each letter indicate where, on your tape counter, you can locate the words on the printed list. For example, all the words beginning with A are between number 75 and number 154. Tape recorders are not made exactly alike.

So there are likely to be some slight differences in the way their counters work. Be prepared to make some minor adjustments when you are looking for a particular word.

You want, for example, to know how A D U L T is pronounced. All you have to do is:

1. Find the word in the printed list.
2. Note its number.
3. Then set your record or cassette accordingly.

You will immediately hear the correct, acceptable pronunciation.

For A D U L T there are 2 pronunciations.

(VOICE)

Repeat the pronunciation of each word out loud right after you hear it. We have allowed enough time between words for you to do this without feeling rushed.

For each word on our list we are using the authoritative pronunciations recorded in the four major American desk dictionaries: THE AMERICAN HERITAGE DICTIONARY OF THE ENGLISH LANGUAGE, WEBSTER'S NEW COLLEGIATE DICTIONARY, THE RANDOM HOUSE COLLEGE DICTIONARY, WEBSTER'S NEW WORLD DICTIONARY OF THE ENGLISH LANGUAGE.

For a great many words, all the dictionaries give only 1 acceptable pronunciation. But they do not agree about the number of acceptable pronunciations of some words. For example, all 4 dictionaries recognize (VOICE) as acceptable. But only 2 of the 4 record a second acceptable pronunciation. We list both pronunciations.

(VOICE)

According to all the dictionaries, the pronunciations you will hear in this program reflect the pronunciations of cultivated speakers from all parts of our country. So you can feel perfectly confident and at ease using any one of them.
