I was looking for a word to describe Bill Price. I thought of energetic." Yes, he's that! Friendly, yes! Accomplished; describes him further. I thought of the trials in his life. his many disappointments and grief. Then it came to me. He's a survivor!

They tell us that to really put feeling into a song, you have to suffer a lot; and Bill has certainly had his share of that. This album expresses the great ability of Bill Price; to put feeling in writing and singing the material for this album. For example, "The Bottle," "Bluegrass Hill," his old standard; "Pretty Polly," and the great tribute to Bill Monroe, "Honoring The Father of Bluegrass," (Big

as Nashville's pavements and the red brick of Ryman Auditorium, can get. A North Carolina boy whose idol was the father of Bluegrass Music; was getting his first big break. After listening to Bill Monroe for many years, even going back to the age of twelve; when he would tune in the Op'ry on a battery operated radio back home on "Bluegrass Hill," here was his big break. He would sing with the master himself! Come back with me to the year 1954. It is June and getting hot

Later Bill Price became the original mandolin player and tenor singer for the famed, "Sunny Mountain Boys," led by Jimmy Martin. The group was on WPFB, Middletown, Ohio. J.D. Crowe was the original Banjo player. Subsequent events caused this great act to go in separate directions. Bill Price formed, "The Country Pard-" and started building a name for himself.

Through efforts of the late Jimmie Skinner, and Lou Epstein in Cincinnati, Ohio; Bill was signed to an exclusive recording contract with RCA Victor Records, and a writer's contract with Acuff and Rose Publishing Co., Nashville, Tenn. His appearances for Victor were supervised by Chet Atkins, and the late "Hall of

Fame" member, Steve Sholes in New York. Bill and the Country Pardners turned out such hits as "Another Old Dog In The Race," "The Maple On The Hill," and the unforgettable, "Pretty Polly," plus others.

There have been some dark years for Bill, I know. He lost a wife and two children to cancer. And after all the suffering that brought I remember Bill Price when he would come in for his own appearances on "The Grand Ole Op'ry." He had been recording songs for "Pappy" Daily out of Houston, Texas. These songs still exist! I remember many of Bill's appearances arranged by Ott Devine, who also hired me on the announcing staff of WSM, back in
