Chip is no ordinary songwriter. He's an acknowledged master. He's one of the best. He wrote the rock anthem, "Wild Thing." He wrote the beautiful "Angel of the Morning": songs, once heard, no one can forget. He's written lots and lots of great songs for so many great artists. The melodies always leave you humming, and the words are full of surprises and meaning.

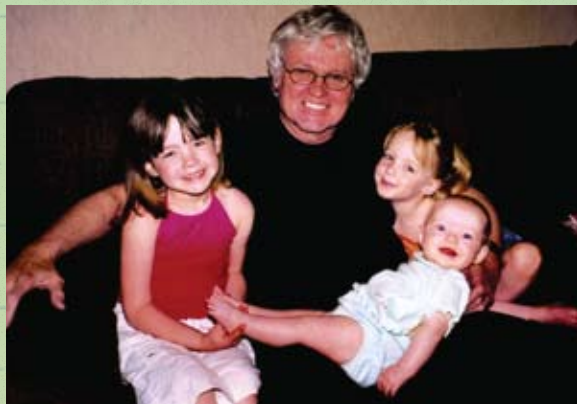
But not all Chip's songs were written for wide audiences. It's a long-standing habit of his to compose songs just for his family on special occasions. A few years ago, for his son Kristian's wedding, he went into a studio with his three grandchildren, Riley, Kate, and Samantha, and they recorded several songs. "Happy Wedding," "Now That Kristian and Anna Have Wed," and the playful "The Possum Hunter" were among them.

I was at the wedding. When the songs were performed, we were all deeply moved and delighted. Chip's voice, full of soul, blended with the pure, untrained voices of the children. The result was magical, and every one of the wedding party cried out for Chip to do more songs like these. Well, I don't think it was in his mind to respond to everyone's wishes, but the songs just came as he spent precious time playing with his grandchildren, and the result is this album.

Charm is an ingredient we seem to have lost in music over the years...and purity. To me, this album is a treasure that comes just at the right time to lift us to a reminder of the power of family and the majesty of children.

I wish I could be with you as you listen to it for the first time. You're going to love it!

Born James Wesley Voight, Chip Taylor was raised in Yonkers, New York, along with his brothers, Oscar-winning actor Jon and renowned volcanologist Barry.

As a boy, Taylor was entranced by the sounds of country music that he heard on the radio via WWVA from West Virginia. WWVA had a strong AM signal that could be picked up at night all over the East Coast. As country music goes, it was the “real McCoy.” He began playing in country bands and while still a teenager was signed to King Records by famed producer and A&R man Henry Glover.

Finding little initial success as a singer, though, Taylor concentrated on songwriting. His songs began to catch the ear of producer Chet Atkins in Nashville, who found it difficult to believe that the songs came from a New Yorker. “But wherever he’s from,” Atkins wrote Taylor’s publisher, “I want to hear every song he writes.” Taylor’s songs were recorded by Willie Nelson, Johnny Cash, Waylon Jennings, Emmylou

Harris, and George Strait. In the '60s, Taylor became one of the key components of the legendary New York popular song factory known as the Brill Building—actually a group of a few buildings on Broadway. One, 1650 Broadway, was where Chip proudly hung his hat. Some of the great popular songs of the era were written there and it was the home to such songwriting pairs as Leiber & Stoller, Barry & Greenwich, and Goffin & King, among many. Taylor was in heady company.

As the '60s went on, Taylor's songs continued to be recorded by numerous artists and also began to hit the R&B and pop charts. His demo recording of “Wild Thing” was heard in the United Kingdom by the Troggs, who turned the garage-punk anthem into a worldwide #1 smash. “Wild Thing” has since been recorded by scores of other artists including Jimi Hendrix (Taylor first encountered Hendrix while working in the Brill Building), Cheap Trick, X, and the Muppets.

Shortly afterwards, another Taylor classic, “Angel of the Morning,” began an amazing run that has made it one of the most played songs in pop music history. It has reached the upper echelon of the charts three different times in versions by Merrilee Rush, Juice Newton, and Shaggy and has been recorded by countless performers.

Having reached the pinnacle of success as a songwriter, Taylor returned to performing in the 1970s, recording a series of acclaimed solo albums. In 1973, Chip Taylor's *Last Chance*, was hailed by *Rolling Stone* as one of the year's best albums. However, chart success was elusive due in part to Taylor's reluctance to tour: it took him away from the racetracks, where he was building a second career as a handicapper.

Eventually, Taylor became a full-time and highly productive gambler. It wasn't until the mid-1990s when he began playing songs for his seriously ill mother that Taylor returned to music. He came back more prolific than ever, recording eight solo albums, four more highly regarded records with duet partner Carrie Rodriguez, and writing and producing records with Rodriguez, Kendel Carson, Evie Sands, and John Platania.

In his later years, this “life moment” has turned Taylor's prodigious songwriting talent inward, toward his family. In the role of a grandparent, he does what grandparents do best—give of themselves. *Golden Kids' Rules* is the honest product of loving family ties crossed with musical genius. In this creative spirit, Chip Taylor joins the likes of other American musical originals such as Woody Guthrie, Lead Belly, Pete Seeger, and Ella Jenkins who have contributed to the Smithsonian Folkways treasure trove of children's music. This is our chance to experience the music of Chip Taylor as we never have experienced before, as a grandfather enchanted by his grandkids.

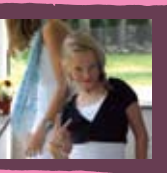
HOW IT ALL BEGAN

On the occasion of my son Kristian's wedding a few years ago, I wrote several songs with the idea that some of their favorite people on the planet—my daughter Kelly and my grandchildren—would sing them with me.

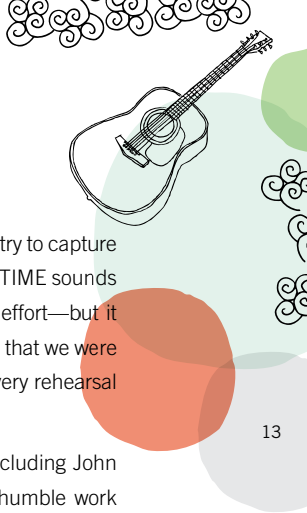
WERE THE GRANDKIDS “SINGERS”?

Well, I guess at the time of my grandkids' first vocal efforts most people would answer, “Not particularly.” But from my point of view everybody is a singer and a GOOD singer as long as they do it like THEY do it and don't try to sound like anyone else. Then they're unique and that makes them GREAT. To my ears, Riley, Kate, and Samantha were GREAT singers right away. And that makes your kids or grandkids GREAT singers too. Congratulations!









REHEARSING

These GREAT singers and their Pepa (me) rehearsed and rehearsed to try to capture their GREATNESS in the most pleasing way possible. IN TUNE and IN TIME sounds pleasing to most people, so we tried to do it like that. And that took effort—but it was a wonderfully worthwhile effort. And the best part of that effort was that we were getting to know each other more and more with every note we sang. Every rehearsal was a total joy for me.

After I recorded the tracks for these songs with my amazing band, including John Platania (Van Morrison), we recorded the girls' voices in my small, humble work studio in Mamaroneck, New York. We had those performances on disc in time to be our wedding gift for Kristian and Anna.

PERFORMING THE SONGS

It seemed a shame to let our good rehearsals go to waste, so we also performed the songs for the wedding guests. It was the grandkids' first live performance, and they were magical. And the audience clapped and cheered, and the girls liked that a lot. Me too.



MORE SONGS TO SING

Singing and rehearsing with Riley, Kate, and Samantha became one of my favorite things to do. So I wrote a bunch of new songs—not silly songs—just songs that put us together in thought and spirit. And I wrote one song based on an amazing pocket-poem that Kate did for school. And that's how *Golden Kids' Rules* began to take shape.

GOLDEN KIDS' RULES

There are lots of smiles here and lots of serious stuff too. And you know what? Kids like singing about serious stuff—because they think about that stuff—whether YOU talk about it or not.

We sing about trust, honesty, kindness, and saving the planet. And also about one parent being a Yankee fan while the other is a Red Sox fan and about old dogs and fears of dying, and dreams for the future.

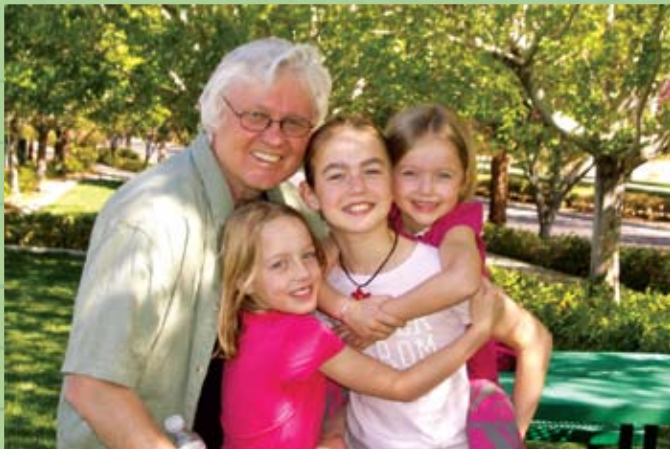
My wife (Mema) loves this album. She has it in her car and listens to it with the grandkids and their friends when she drives them here and there—pretty much all the time.

The songs teach about respect for different ways of living.

Mema says, “All the songs teach kids to feel better about themselves! They are such a good starting off point for grandparents (or parents) to have a conversation about issues that might be on kids’ minds—issues that they don’t talk about so easily. The songs teach about respect for different ways of living.” Mema’s usually right!


When we finished recording the album, I played the songs for my friend Bruce Lundvall from Blue Note Records. He said the recordings had a special warmth and magic that he had never heard in a kids’ album. He passed it around to his entire family. He said the recording was timeless, and a record company should be found that would treat it that way.

And so here we are at Smithsonian Folkways, and the folks here seem to love it like Bruce and others who have heard it. And these nice folks will pass it around to families forever. What a nice thought.

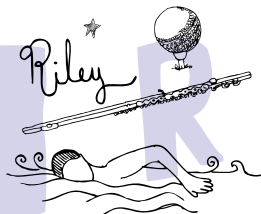


THE GRANDKIDS

She likes to root for her sisters when they play sports and soon will be playing soccer and softball. She has the very good habit of asking questions whenever she doesn't understand something. Lots of kids forget to do that.
